

F.C.C. is a member of the Scottish Photographic Federation and affiliated to the Photographic Alliance of Great Britain. These organisations provide access to Lecturers and accredited Competition Judges although we also invite experienced lecturers and adjudicators from outside those circles. We will also organise Workshops in response to requests from the membership so please let us know the type of events which you seek. Our current longest serving club members joined F.C.C. when cameras solely used film, Video Recorders were in many homes and Falkirk F.C. played at a place called Brockville but, please don't remind 'em! Our newest members joined this season or during recent years and are the future of F.C.C., the legacy started in 1889 so no pressure folks. This has been one of the busiest ever "close" seasons at F.C.C. An exhibition in Falkirk Town Hall by a Past President, David Jones, was followed by work from Agnes Clark L.R.P.S. included in the Royal Photographic Society exhibition in the same venue and we now look forward to an exhibition from Frank Owens at F.T.H. which opens in November. Club members old (sort of) and new are always around to help or advise. Just ask, and enjoy your membership.

Audio Visual Group

An Audio Visual presentation is a sequence of photographs set to music, commentary, or a mixture of both which explores a theme or tells a story. It might last just a few minutes or significantly longer and visiting lecturers may include A.V. sequences within their presentations in the same way that Tom Bowser included Video programmes in his presentation on Argaty Red Kites on 5th September. A.V. has been a feature at Falkirk C.C. for many years and took a step forward a few years ago with the formation of an A.V. Group. It meets most months, often on a Wednesday evening with only the usual £2.50 levy as a contribution towards costs. A.V. 'ists (Audio Visualisers?) will show sequences under construction or completed, get advice, share ideas and look at what's new in the A.V. world. Some Post Processing packages already include an A.V. facility and there are specialist programmes if your interest develops. Seek out Joan Clarke or Geof Longstaff for more information.

Talking Pictures

Photography is used for many purposes and can change the way we perceive the world. It can be used to tell a story, to report factual events or, more simply, to illustrate an Instruction Manual. It can be used for record purposes or, at the other end of the scale, as a means of self expression. It can be a welcome challenge or a means of relaxation, not that we need relaxation in the calm and ordered world in which we live Writing is a similar pursuit and writers have similar avenues open to them as do photographers. Falkirk Writers Circle and Falkirk Camera Club have an annual collaboration which initially took the form of an exhibition. The writers made a selection from photographs supplied by the photographers then produced pieces of poetry or prose inspired by those images. The photographs and writing were then exhibited together. These days, it takes the form of a joint meeting of both groups which you will find in the F.C.C. Syllabus. We call it Talking Pictures and, against the backdrop of the Projected Digital Image, the photographer can explain their motivation for producing the photograph and is then followed by the writer who reads their composition. That composition can be funny, profound or thought provoking and it's great to hear how a writer has interpreted our work. The collaboration sometimes extends into other exercises too. The photograph below is from lan Trapp and the writing by Jean Currie. We put them together a few years ago as a gift for the, then, Provost who had supported another collaboration between Falkirk Camera Club and the Rotary Clubs of Falkirk District.

We will ask for contributions to this season's Talking Pictures soon.

Inspired by Bill Brandt and Alfred Stieglitz, among others, his work is collected by major galleries and museums worldwide and he is renowned for his highly expressive representations of the landscape. This quote from him might be apposite for our time. "I prefer suggestion over description, the world is pretty chaotic, seemingly always speeding up and getting louder and more visually dense. I am interested in finding and/or creating calm shelters from the storm, places where quiet and solitude is encouraged and inner contemplation possible. The Long Look | The Making Of A Portrait

A collaboration between painter Audrey Grant, photographer and printmaker Norman McBeath with novelist Val McDiarmid. Audrey asked Norman to sit for a portrait in charcoal for a project lasting probably several months. She asked him to photograph the drawing at the end of each sitting and then erased the drawing at the start of the next sitting and began anew. The project turned into several years as Val became the second sitter. This fascinating exhibition uses Audrey's artwork and materials plus Norman's photographs to document how the final portraits evolved.

Microsculpture: The Insect Portraits of Levon Bliss. Held in Inverleith House, near the West Gate, the astonishing clarity of these images of insects which in real life range from 1cm to 3cm in length but exhibited on prints approximately 10 feet long will take your breath away. Levon Bliss is the British photographer who photographed these specimens from the Museum of Natural History in Oxford. There is a life size reproduction of each insect beside each print and a film of the photographer at work using some quite serious equipment. The photographs often involve around 8,000 exposure for one finished photograph.

St Andrews Photography Festival, St Andrews, Fife.


4th October - 27th October 2019

Soon after Henry Talbot (1800 - 1877) at Lacock announced his Calotype process in 1839 he visited his friend Sir David Brewster (1781 - 1868) at the University of St Andrews. DB introduced him to Dr John Adamson (1809 - 1870) who began a series of advancements making St Andrews the cradle of photography. Organised by the Photographic Collections department at the University, this years festival has the theme of Science & Photography. the aim here is to present some photographers from the wider photographic community whom you might want to research online Last time it was Sally Mann (b. 1951) who said "Every image is in some way a "portrait," not in the way that it would reproduce the traits of a person, but in that it pulls and draws (this is the semantic and etymological sense of the word), in that it extracts something, an intimacy, a force." One of America's most renowned photographers. Time magazine wrote: Few photographers of any time or place have matched Sally Mann's steadiness of simple eyesight, her serene technical brilliance, and the clearly communicated eloquence she derives from her subjects, human or otherwise - subjects observed with an ardor that is all but indistinguishable from love.

This time, who said: Photography takes an instant out of time, altering life by holding it still.
